

COURSE OVERVIEW

• The course has 3 elements. The elements are equally weighted.

Philosophy of Religion

Plato, Aristotle, Descartes, arguments for the existence of God, the problem of evil, religious language and the nature of the divine.

Ethics

Kant and the categorical imperative, Utilitarianism, Situation ethics, natural law, meta ethics, conscience, business ethics and sexual ethics

Developments in Christian thought


The afterlife, The person of Jesus, Christian morality, gender and society, liberation theology, the challenge of secularism, Christian moral action

COURSE OVERVIEW

- The course is assessed through three examinations at the end of Year 13.
- Each examination is worth 33% of the final grade.
- Each examination is two hours long.

Students will be asked to write three essays (from a choice of

four questions) in each examination.



TRANSFERABLE SKILLS AND FUTURE CAREERS

- Critical thinking, evaluation, logic and the construction of logical arguments, problem solving.
- Research and communication skills including project work, essay writing and verbal communication skills.

- The Philosophy A level is a highly desirable qualification (as is the degree) because the above skills are valued by a wide range of employers.
